Dear Parents, Carers and Staff,

I was privileged this term to attend the VCE Premier's Awards, where 22 students from the VSL were recognised for their outstanding achievement in languages. It was a day of celebration for the students and parents, as well as recognition for our hard-working teachers. Later in this bulletin, you will hear what the students are doing this year, and some reflections on their time at the VSL.

This term the VSL has undertaken our four-yearly Strategic Review, which is a Department of Education requirement. We were pleased to have a panel that consisted of Jane Warren (Valad Solutions – an experienced and endorsed reviewer), Bruna Pasqua (our School Council President), Mel Quin, (Director - Literacy, Languages and Student Excellence Division) and Trevor Strolla (Principal, Brunswick South

Primary School – a multi-lingual school). The review totalled 5 days, including three days of "field work" which included visits to centres, observations of lessons in our Distance Education and Virtual New Arrivals programs, and consultation with parents and students. Thank you to all who contributed to this important work. The result is the development of a new Strategic Plan for the next four years, which is in the process of being finalised. Once completed you will be able to find it on our website at www.vsl.vic.edu.au.

Parents will have noticed that our roll-out of Compass is underway, and we hope that it will provide a stronger communication channel for you. Like any newly introduced technology, it can take some time to adjust but we are working through methodically to ensure that we have a consistent approach across all centres.

Our enrolment process for 2024 will commence early in Term 4. Current students will be given the opportunity to enrol into classes prior to them being opened to the general public. With the pressure of places in many of our centres, I encourage you to enrol as soon as you are able to ensure your child can get the class of their choice. An individual link will be provided to all current students and students on the waiting list next term so they can enrol for 2024, so please check your emails and our website regularly. Should you have any concerns or queries about the enrolment process, or need support to complete the enrolment, you should contact your centre supervisor or area manager in the first instance

Finally, I advise that I will be taking Long Service Leave between 1st and 15th September, and Joe Tosic will be acting in my place. Thank you as always for your ongoing support.

VCE-Punjabi Students celebrating the 'Area of Study -Fairs and Festivals' at the Thomastown Centre

On Saturday 22 July, VCE Punjabi students at VSL Thomastown celebrated their learning of the sub-topic on 'Fairs and Festivals' under the theme 'The Punjabi-Speaking communities' by getting involved in the festival type atmosphere in their classroom and got to experience and celebrate traditional day. Students learned about the native months, different festivals and fairs we celebrate in our Punjabi culture in their learning on this topic. Most of the text types used to explain and understand fairs and festivals were Poems so that the students learn understanding the deeper meanings of the information given in poems/poetry.



On this day, students got the opportunity to proudly showcase their Punjabi culture by wearing traditional Punjabi attire in many vibrant and beautiful colours. Girls looked beautiful in Punjabi suits and boys looked great in Kurta Pyjama and turbans. A new native month, 'Saawan', started on 16 July, which is the month of dancing, singing, eating delicious sweets, and spreading happiness throughout the month of rains. The activity started with the teacher explaining the meaning of two following lines to the students.

> ਸਾਵਣਿ ਸਰਸੀ ਕਾਮਣੀ ਚਰਨ ਕਮਲ ਸਿਉ ਪਿਆਰ ।। ਮਨੂ ਤਨੂ ਰਤਾ ਸਚ ਰੰਗਿ ਇਕੋ ਨਾਮ ਅਧਾਰ ।।

(In the month of Saawan, the soul-bride is happy, if she falls in love with the Lotus Feet of the Lord. Her mind and body are imbued with the Love of the True One; His Name is her only Support.)

A highlight of these celebrations were the performances showed in the class, where all the students performed on something related to the beautiful and rich culture of Punjab. Their performances created

a positive and enlightening atmosphere, which engaged everyone's attention. Some of these performances were Punjabi poetry, showand-tell of traditional objects and Punjabi folk dance- gidda. Whereas two students got their traditional musical instruments 'Dilruba' and sang a shabad (sikh devotional music) to the class in Raag Malaar, a raag which is sung during the month of Saavan. The other pair of students sang and danced on the folk songs which lifted the energy of all the students up.



From the last 2-3 years, there was no cultural activity organised at the centre due to the COVID restrictions. Students were slightly reluctant to wear their traditional attires but after the event they are more confident and motivated about their traditions. This day helped the students to understand the beauty of their culture, roots, and identities. It was an amazing experience and it made them proud to be who they are. Everyone enjoyed that day and felt the strong connection to their roots and a deeper appreciation for the rich heritage.

Overall, the traditional celebration day was a heartwarming and enlightening experience that helped the students to further reinforce the importance of cherishing and preserving our cultural heritage. It is important for students to learn that living in such a modern society we may not always have time or the opportunity to dress up and show off our culture. So, they should never fear wearing their own traditional clothes and should always shine out be bright like the stars in the dark stary night whenever there is an opportunity. Hopefully the future Punjabi students also get to enjoy these celebrations as much as these students did and immerse themselves into Punjabi culture.

Ahdia Haidari: My Journey

Persian Student (VCE Units 1&2) at VSL Dandenong. Ahdia's teacher is Sayed Quraishi.

My name is Ahdia Haidari. I am from Afghanistan, and I am a year 11 student studying in Victoria. I am an 18-year-old athlete who has played for the Afghanistan Women's National Football Team (AWNT) for almost five years.

I started playing soccer in 2018 with one of my friends, and I had to keep this secret from my dad. It was really difficult for me to hide this from my father. In the beginning I told him I couldn't continue my goals at that time. Then I started playing professionally in 2019 for the U17 Women's National team.

When I started playing soccer, lots of people around me said, "You can't play soccer because you're a girl and playing soccer is just for boys, not for you". This is the opinion of people in my country. I asked why girls can't play sports. They had no good reason as an answer; however I didn't listen to them. Instead, I told myself I could play and achieve my goals. It was always trying to find a solution for all the hardships I had experienced, but finding a solution at that age when there was no possibility was really tough. Sometimes I had no hope for my goals and dreams.

It was really challenging and I spent hours, days, months and years thinking about what to do to reduce all these problems and I always told myself that I could, but life was getting harder every day and I had less faith that I could solve these life problems. Life is never easy. I have seen many hardships and problems in my life, and I have learned many things.

The most valuable thing in my life is my mum and my older sister. My mother told me to be independent in my life, because getting married is really simple to do in this country and she didn't want me to be that kind of woman. My mum wants me to become a strong woman to fight for my goals and my dreams. She always gives me hope that I can do it. My mum said to me, "Tough times create strong women. Strong women create easy times. Easy times create weak women. Weak women create tough times". She told me, many will not understand, but you always need to keep going. Always! No matter what happens, because it's life. For my mum's sake, I will try harder to be the best that I can to make her proud and make her life a little easier.

I came to Australia when I was just 16 years old. I didn't know how hard it could be living without family and living in a different country to learning a new language. I came here with no English and I studied English here. It was really difficult for me to learn a new language and still, every day is challenging for me. I promise I will never give up. I will try my best in everything.

Now, I play for Melbourne Victory (AWT) after my country Afghanistan fell in August 2021. I remember, we hid in one room for almost 2 weeks. I was really scared because the Taliban like to fire guns to scare people. There were nights when I could not sleep or eat properly. The thing I did most during that time was crying and crying. I had no hope for living. Also, it was the first time in my life I saw adults were scared and shocked, and everyone tried to fight just to live.

When the Taliban took over it was really dangerous for me and my family to continue living there. It was impossible for me to continue my soccer and my education in Afghanistan. It's been close to two years in my country that girls can't go to high school, university, work or exercise because of the Taliban not allowing them. The Taliban do not respect the girls and women in Afghanistan. I couldn't take the valuable things from my room like medals or jumpers that represent my first trip to another country. How hard I tried to get one of those to represent my country and show the people who said that girls can't make it. I couldn't take even one of them. We just left everything behind.

I wish one day I can play again for my country and raise the flag of my country, because everywhere I see lots of flags from different countries, but I don't see the flag of my country and that makes me feel so sad for my country. I will never forget all of the things that happened in my country. My role model in football has always been Cristiano Ronaldo. He is an amazing player in the world. He had a really powerful story about how challenging his life was, but he never gave up on his goals. He makes everyone smile and gives people motivation to keep going. I hope in the future I can meet him.

I hope I can help people in my country and people around the world who need help. It doesn't matter for me which country they are from or what colour their skin is, the important thing for me is that they are happy and healthy.

I want to share my story with all people in the world one day and give them positive thoughts about everything.

Today the thing I'm really happy about is that I didn't have to give up on my goals, but every day is difficult for me to tell the people around me that girls can be a role model for those who are struggling to achieve their goals. Girls can do whatever they like to do.

The big thing is that I changed my dad's mind about playing soccer as a girl. It was very hard to do this, but nothing is impossible. You just need to focus and believe in yourself to achieve your goals and dreams. Now he is really happy that I made it.

I want to give all girls hope that nothing is inconceivable. Doing this means a lot for me.

Additional Premier's VCE Awards Winners

The selection of the VCE Awards winners is managed by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority. The number of Awards in each study is calculated using the enrolment base in that study. Hence there are more awards in larger studies.

Thirteen of the Award winners were profiled in the last Family & Staff Bulletin. Here, three of our Premier's Award winners, Mery Lin Zathang (Chin Hakha), Ami Aggarwali (Hindi) and Han Mai (Vietnamese Second Language), were available to be profiled.



Mery Lin Zathang – Chin Hakha

Chin Hakha is not only my native language; I also see the importance and value in knowing more than one language and keeping the tradition and culture alive. My main challenge during 2022 was balancing school with my personal life. I know I needed to focus on getting good results, but at the same time, there is a part-time job and other commitments. Trying to balance all of these was challenging; however, at the end of the day, these challenges shaped us into who we are today: stronger and more resilient. I wanted to do well in my oral and written exams, so I did a lot of preparation. I practised with friends and family and looked at all the past exams. Being able to speak and know more than one language, especially your native language fluently, is something to be proud of. Going to school on Saturday is a hustle, especially when there are other fun things to do, but the sacrifice and the extra effort pay off. I want to pursue medicine, and with the language that I have acquired, I want to be able to comfortably and intimately communicate with my Chin people and hear their concerns regarding any health issues as a lot of the time, due to the language barrier many people are unable to communicate their conditions effectively, and this is something that I have noticed and would like to minimise and help through in the future.



Ami Aggarwal - Hindi

As I immigrated to Australia from India, I didn't want to lose touch with my mother tongue. The VSL offered a way to stay in touch with Hindi and enabled me to improve my knowledge further. Fortunately, the VSL centre was on my secondary college campus. While I found learning Hindi enjoyable, the experiential learning, guided by my teacher, Mrs Thethi, added to the experience. The biggest challenge was learning to apply theoretical knowledge of Hindi for practical purposes creatively. In other words, writing a simple letter, essay, or story is easier, but it is challenging to write it creatively, demonstrating advanced skills in Hindi. I am lucky that Mrs Thethi guided me to overcome this challenge. My advice to younger students can be summarised in the quote -"The man who moves a mountain begins by carrying away small stones". Taking small steps and practising regularly will help you achieve your goals. I want to pursue a career in helping people through science and technology.



Han Mai - Vietnamese Second Language


I chose to study Vietnamese at VSL to learn more about my Vietnamese heritage and better understand the language. I appreciated the opportunity to do this as a VCE subject as well. The main challenge I faced during the year was balancing the work in Vietnamese with the other subjects I was doing in year 11 simultaneously and being able to travel to Footscray every week for the classes. I approached my oral exam with much less confidence than the written exam because it felt so much more intense being face-to-face with the assessors. I was still pretty nervous about the written exam, though. Learning a language forces you to learn and use skills you might not have otherwise learned in other VCE subjects. It's also a subject that will help you with your plans after high school. The advice I would give is to start doing practice exams under timed conditions as early as possible because I feel like Vietnamese is a subject where there's not as much specific content you need to learn to be able to do the exams. It's more about practising your skills. I remember being overwhelmed by the exam towards the beginning of the year, and honestly, I could not imagine how I could do that many things in only 2 hours, but the practice helped so much. Also, during the year, do as much writing practice as possible and get feedback from your teachers - I wished I had done more of last year. I'm hoping to pursue a career in law and commerce, and knowing Vietnamese would hopefully help me work in Vietnam or Vietnamese communities.

Distance Education

Supporting Your Year 12 Language Learner

And just like that, we are rapidly approaching the conclusion of VSL studies for yet another cohort of Year 12 language learners. Some will have joined us this year and wrestled with the challenges of distance learning juxtaposed with the pressures of Units 3 and 4. Others have been with the VSL for almost six years and be suddenly preparing for an oral exam with someone other than their distance education teacher. Either way, or somewhere in between, we recognise that each student faces their own individual difficulties and stresses in the ever-shortening run up to final exams.

While a little bit of stress often brings out the best in us, we know that students are likely to perform at their peak when they are feeling a certain calm and quiet confidence. But where does this come from? How can we help our young people to feel most at ease as they approach a significant period in their lives? I think we can take advice from elite athletes, musicians, and other performers about the power of preparation. I think that preparation can take many forms and is a much broader activity than simply reading over class notes or textbooks.



1. Practice Makes... Better.

No matter what the area of life, the more you practise it, the better you get. Exams are no different. Completing regular practice exams is a great strategy for all your subjects, but especially for languages. This practice could take the form of a mock oral exam with the VSL or a practice written exam with teachers patrolling between single desks in the school gymnasium. But it could also be selecting an exam section and completing it at your desk at home under exam conditions. The written exams for languages

often have unusual topics, so that students are all on the same level with the tasks and questions, so completing lots of past exams as practice can be the key to exam success. It can help learners get used to the different question types and what to look for when giving responses. I can guarantee that you will find plenty of practice in our distance education courses too.



2. Balancing Act

If you want to help students to get the best out of themselves in their preparation and then in their exams, balance is one of the most vital pieces of the puzzle. Think about it like this. If you were training for a marathon, you would do a lot of running. But it wouldn't be the only thing you did. You would still catch up with friends, read a book, watch the latest episode of your favourite show, walk the dog, and eat a meal with your family. But you probably wouldn't watch a season of your favourite show in one go. And you probably wouldn't get an extra dessert at the restaurant. To avoid FOMO, help your child plan preparation around some of their normal activities to help them stay focused when they need to most.

3. Healthy Habits

If they're going to be sharp at the pointy end of this year, students will need to make sure they're not just mentally in the zone, but physically too. There are many little things we all should do, but maybe we don't always stick to them. There's a bit more motivation as students approach exams, so encourage them to think about picking up some new habits. First, they should try to make sure they're well rested. A good night's sleep helps the body repair itself, so encourage them to keep a good sleep routine, preferably one that can work both on school days and weekends. They should also drink plenty of water and eat healthy foods that will give them enough energy for study. Fast food won't help here! And they could consider learning some breathing exercises or how to meditate (try YouTube!) – these skills will stand students in good stead come exam day and potentially heightened nerves.
